DataHaven is a non-profit 501(c)3 organization dedicated to improving the Greater New Haven and Valley Region by compiling and sharing high-quality public information for effective decision making.

DataHaven processes a large quantity of information from various Federal, state, and local sources and makes it more useful for local communities, in part through our website at www.ctdatahaven.org. Since 1992, DataHaven has worked with area organizations to create community indicators, reports, and online tools. DataHaven is a partner of the Connecticut Data Collaborative (www.ctdata.org), a new initiative that advances the use of high-quality data in state and local policymaking.

In addition to its core activities, DataHaven provides a limited amount of free technical assistance and training to local nonprofits. Other services that we provide include report writing, mapping, data analysis, survey design and collection, and assistance with grants or needs assessments.

Our 20-year evolution.

1992: The Community Foundation for Greater New Haven convenes Regional Data Cooperative among leaders of New Haven-area agencies, universities, and governments as a way to share data on infant health, public safety, demographics and other issues.


1995: Publication of New Haven Maps, a report which analyzes and maps data from across multiple sectors and encourages data sharing among 20 local and state organizations.

2000: Regional Data Cooperative for Greater New Haven, Inc., incorporated as a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization.

2003: Organization launches interactive data website, and rebrands itself as DataHaven. The new website facilitates dissemination of United Way's Compass Community Indicators Survey and Report, a comprehensive analysis of issues facing the Greater New Haven Region.

2008: DataHaven becomes a formal partner representing Greater New Haven and the Valley Region within the National Neighborhood Indicators Partnership, a collaborative effort by the Urban Institute and 35 cities across the country to further the use of neighborhood information systems in local policymaking and community building.

2009: Publication of New Haven Health Data Atlas, a report on health conditions in New Haven 2010: DataHaven hires first full-time Executive Director and launches new website. In partnership with several local organizations, DataHaven analyzes over 4,000 survey responses from residents on topics ranging from the closing of Shaw's Supermarket to general neighborhood quality of life.

2011: DataHaven joins as a partner and "data steward" of the new Connecticut Data Collaborative. Publications include Creating a Healthy and Safe City, a report co-authored with the New Haven Health Department about public safety concerns

2012: DataHaven is updating the comprehensive community indicators report about the Greater New Haven and Valley Region and its neighborhoods. In partnership with several other organizations currently conducting needs assessments within Greater New Haven, we will be conducting a randomized household cell phone and landline survey this fall.
